Though I did not attend any other events at the conference, Alpha Phi was ably represented by Sam Bone '10 and Taylor Bryant '10.

This fall promises great things, both at the Capstone and at Alpha Phi. The House Corporation has initiated a series of projects to make the Chapter House more livable. **Mike Sanders '78**, **Dru Horton '98**, and a group of undergraduate members spent several days of manual labor cleaning up the house inside and out, painting the downstairs interior, and landscaping. We have retained a local contractor to paint the upstairs hallways and rooms and to make much-needed repairs.

Dru is also working on the development of a new Web site. Communication with alumni, active brothers, and prospective members has been our focus over the last two years, and a user-friendly Web site will facilitate that effort. Mike started a new Facebook group, Theta Chi—University of Alabama, only a month ago, and there are

already 287 members. It is pretty neat to surf through and see what is going on with pledge brothers you have not seen in years.

The Chapter ended last year on a high note, coming in fourth overall in academics with a 3.0 G.P.A., well above both the all-men's and all-fraternity averages. The undergraduate officers put the Chapter in a good financial position for the coming year, working with Greek Resources on budgeting and holding a strong summer recruitment. Please remember Alpha Phi when your children, nephews, or friends' children decide to enroll at the U of A. The Chapter recruits year round and is always on the lookout for prospective members.

Finally, the Tide will surely be rolling this year, and I am counting the days until we hit the field in Atlanta. Theta Chi Loses Beloved Leader

Alpha Phi Remembers Howard "Big Daddy" Alter Jr., Omega '41



Howard Alter Jr., Omega '41 was a proud honorary member of Alpha Phi and had close relationships with many alumni, including Marvin McConaghy '72.

on May 9, 2009, **Howard R. Alter Jr.**, *Omega '41*, lost his battle with cancer and Theta Chi lost one of its most beloved leaders. Howard was undergraduate treasurer and president of Omega Chapter at Penn State and served as national president, executive director, and president of the Norwich Housing Corporation. None but our own **Dale Taylor '69** has held those three highest offices in Theta Chi. Howard was the recipient of every award that the Fraternity can bestow and received interfraternal awards from a host of other national fraternities. He served as president of the Fraternity Executives Association and on the board of the North American Interfraternity Conference. He was the recipient of its Gold Medal—the most prestigious award in the fraternity world.

The highest award bestowed on a Theta Chi Chapter is named in his honor, and Alpha Phi has won the Alter Award a record-setting eight times.

Howard was also a proud honorary member of Alpha Phi Chapter, visiting several times, and enjoyed close relationships with many Alpha Phis. Pete Mackey '78, Wes Wicker '79, and I served on his field staff, and although Lucas Elgie '05 joined later, Howard considered him one of "his boys." All four of us attended his funeral, as did the eight living national presidents and scores of officers, alumni, and undergraduates. Pete and I were honored to join four of Howard's graying boys in carrying him to his rest.

Howard lived on a 250-acre farm in a Victorian house his prohibitionist grandfather built in the 1880s, but many of us enjoyed generously poured adult libations on the expansive back porch over the years. The hospitality and stories shared there were legendary. On the mantle of the library where Howard spent his final days were two framed renderings of chapter houses—his own Omega Chapter and our Alpha Phi.

Howard was an only child who never married or had children—the last of the Alter line. Yet scores of us called him by the name with which a secretary in the headquarters once tagged him, Big Daddy. He was a second father to many of us, and the legacy he leaves to all of Theta Chi is unparalleled.

Dale Taylor '69 Reminisces About Alpha Phi



Dale Taylor '69 serves as executive director of Theta Chi Fraternity. He manages and supervises the International Headquarters staff and the day-to-day operations of the fraternity consistent with the policies established by the Grand Chapter. He also performs other duties as may be assigned to him from time to time. Here he shares his thoughts on Alpha Phi:

"There was always something special each fall as I came back to school and walked into the fraternity house. It was not just the excitement of another year of school, nor was it the anticipation

of seeing everyone again after the summer break. I actually believe the house had a certain smell, just like a new car smell, that was only there at that house and at that time. Yeah, I know, stale beer and leftover food can do that after three months, but it was not that. Actually, it was the smell of brotherhood to me. It meant we would soon be asking new men to join our

Theta Chi—a chance to make new friends, some of whom would be lifelong friends.

You develop connections to smells, sights, and words in your mind so that one triggers other thoughts. Those of us from that time still refer to the 'new' house, although now it is almost 50 years new. That facility, with its smells and look, triggers lots of great thoughts for me about the brother-hood I joined those many years ago.

A facility can be much more than something to bring back memories, it can be the agent that brings on change, or improves morale of the group, or encourages more men to pledge, or offers new connections to those already members in our Fraternity.

We have had several groups build new facilities lately thanks to those alumni who remember their fraternal experience and want to ensure that others have the same opportunities to develop memories and to join the great connecting brotherhood of Theta Chi. We need to believe that it can happen everywhere with increased Chapter involvement of our alumni brothers and with help in developing the undergraduate members. Our creed begins with 'I believe in Theta Chi,' so let us all believe and remember—for me, the smell and the individuals, for you, the trigger may be different. Clasp the hands of your friends, your brothers, and 'believe.'"

Alpha Phi a Family Affair for Jim '58 and Bill Oakley '81



Jim Oakley '58 came to the University of Alabama in 1953. Shortly after arrival he pledged Alpha Phi Chapter with Herbert Moore '58, son of Alpha Phi charter member L. S. Moore '27.

Jim was a staff member of the Crimson White and a part-time photographer for the University. He covered the famous

Autherine Lucy riots that erupted on campus when the first black student was admitted. Many of his pictures were printed around the world, and his negatives and photographs are in the library's Hoole Special Collections.

After graduating in 1958, Jim joined a family newspaper in Centreville, Alabama. He became publisher in 1972, sold the newspaper in 1985, and joined the UA faculty in the College of Communication. He is a recruiter, advisor, and career counselor for the college.

Jim's youngest son, Bill '81, pledged Alpha Phi in 1977 and majored in journalism. After graduation in 1981, he accepted a job with the University Relations Department as director of special projects. He developed a recruitment program for honor students involving the UA president, alumni chapters around the country, and local media, resulting in a substantial increase in the number of Presidential Scholarship recipients that came to the University.

Bill left the University in 1984 to become the first director of marketing and promotions for the Hall of Fame NCAA bowl game in Birmingham. He remained there until 1989, when he joined the PGA Tour as a tour media official. He developed year-round media plans for PGA tournaments and supervised media center operations at tour events. Since then, Bill has served in several capacities and is currently director of tournament business affairs and sponsor relations.

Bill and his wife, Glenda, have three children and live in Ponte Vedra Beach, Florida. Bill's oldest son, Will, was a member of the UA football team for five years under coaches Mike Shula and Nick Saban. He graduated in 2008 with a degree in marketing, a master's degree in marketing in 2009, and is attending law school at the University of Florida.

Ron Gray '81 of Huntsville is one of three trustees unanimously elected to the UA System Board of Trustees at the most recent meeting. "We were looking for younger people with diversity in their backgrounds, and we feel these are young, outstanding leaders in this state," said Joe Espy, chairman of the board's nominating committee. Espy said all three are younger than 50. Gray fills one of the two seats representing the fifth congressional district, which covers most of north Alabama.

Ron graduated with a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering in 1981. He is the founder and president of Gray Research Inc. in Huntsville and is responsible for the company's overall management and operation. Gray Research has 190 employees and provides engineering and management assistance to the United States Department of Defense and NASA.

Ron has been honored with several appointments, including 2005 Huntsville Chamber of Commerce Executive of the Year Contender, 2006 Huntsville Chamber of Commerce Entrepreneur of the Year Finalist, 2006 Ernst and Young Entrepreneur of the Year Regional Finalist, and 2007 Engineering Fellow, University of Alabama College of Engineering.

Ron's wife, Cindy, serves as senior vice president of Gray Research. They have two children, Jennifer (23) and Charlie (20). Ron's brothers, **Steve '76** and **Scott '85** reside in Decatur.

Steve Johnson '75 began his duties as president and CEO of Bay Medical Center in August 2001. He came to Bay Medical Center with more than 20 years experience as a health care administrator, including 15 years as CEO of Coosa Valley Baptist Medical Center, a 226-bed hospital in Sylacauga, Alabama. In addition to serving as CEO, he served as interim CEO of Citizens Baptist Medical Center, a 123-bed hospital in Talladega, Alabama, from 1996 to 2000. He holds a master's degree in hospital and health administration from the University of Alabama.

Under Steve's administration, the hospital has made many strides. In 2005, Bay Medical was recognized as one of Solucient's 100 Top Hospitals in America and was ranked among the top five percent in the nation for overall clinical quality from 2004 to 2007. Only 72

Chris left Tuscaloosa for Montgomery to cover the sports beat, and moved to Huntsville in 1983. He has been in Huntsville for the last 26 years.

Chris has covered high school sports and Auburn and Alabama football, including the 1993 national championship. He received the prestigious Sports Writer of the Year award for the state of Alabama in 1986 and became sports editor in 1994. As a sportswriter, Chris had the opportunity to interview the likes of Bear Bryant, Pat Dye, Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris, Joe DiMaggio, Arnold Palmer, Mike Shula, Gene Stallings, Jimmy Connors, John McEnroe, and many others. He stepped down to spend more time with his daughter, Abbie Grace.

Chris became an entertainment writer and loves covering everything from concerts, to the circus, to Sesame Street. He has interviewed Kid Rock, Taylor Swift, Taylor Hicks, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Billy Bob Thornton, Mercy Me, Sugarland, Little Big Town, David Copperfield, and Charlie Daniels, just to name a few. Chris says he is very blessed with his job and his beautiful daughter.

Recent Graduate Covers Southeast Football for Scout.com



Andrew Bone '07 was born in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, raised in Gadsden, and currently resides in Birmingham. He attended Westbrook Christian School, where he played football and basketball. Throughout his senior year Andrew was recruited to play football and was interviewed several times by Scout.com. He was an "invited walk-on" at the University of Alabama as a wide receiver, but after deciding not to play college football, Scout.com offered Andrew a position to work within the company.

Andrew attended the University of Alabama from 2003 to 2009 and pledged Theta Chi Fraternity in 2003. He earned a degree in communication studies and a minor in computer science.

In August 2003, Andrew began working for Scout.com and moved up through the years to his current position of assistant regional manager of the southeast. He is also the recruiting analyst for the *Tuscaloosa News* and the publisher of his own high school football Web site, ScoutSouth.com.

JOHN WARD '77 DIRECTOR OF CDC'S VIRAL HEPATITIS PROGRAM



Dr. John Ward '77 is director of the Division of Viral Hepatitis at the CDC. John is responsible for planning and directing national and international research, surveillance, and public health programs related to viral hepatitis prevention and control.

In addition to his work in viral hepatitis, John's experience includes 14 years in the field conducting early studies of AIDS transmission, natural history and diagnosis, evaluating prevention measures to protect the blood supply, and directing national HIV/AIDS surveillance. John has also served as editor of

the *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report*, CDC's primary health publication. As editor, John created the Epidemic Information Exchange, a secure, moderated system for public health officials to report and discuss disease outbreaks and other health events. John has authored more thn 100 scientific publications and recently served as editor for *Silent Victories*, a history of public health in the 20th century.

John received his medical degree from the University of Alabama School of Medicine and completed an internship and residency in internal medicine at the University of Alabama Hospitals, with additional postgraduate training at the London School of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene, CDC's Epidemic Intelligence Service, and the infectious diseases fellowship program at the University of Washington Medical Center in Seattle. He holds a clinical faculty appointment with the Department of Medicine at Emory University.

Ed Smith Jr. '75, Alagasco General Manager of Operational Planning, was elected president of the Alabama Natural Gas Association (ANGA) for the 2009-10 year. Ed will serve as the 44th president of the organization and is the sixth Alagasco employee to serve as ANGA president.

To Ed, ANGA is not just another organization—it's a family tradition. His father, Ed Smith Sr., was a charter officer of ANGA and served as first vice president of the association in 1969.

"I was fortunate enough to work for people who gave me the opportunity to be innovative," he says. "I am glad that people like Dudley Reynolds, Bill Bibb, and Ken Smith have confidence in me."

fter taking an outside sales job in Birmingham, Alabama, shortly after graduating in August 2005, I realized that I was not heading down the right path for my life. I left the job after eight months and went to work as a leadership and education consultant for Theta Chi International Headquarters. For a year I traveled around the country, mostly by car, visiting chapters and facilitating presentations on leadership, risk management, standards, recruitment, or whatever area the brothers needed help with. I also had the pleasure of serving as an expansion consultant and recruited men to re-colonize two closed chapters, Beta Delta at Rutgers University and Gamma Delta at Florida Southern College.
