A bout five years ago, **Pat Hughes '76** convinced me to get reinvolved with the House Corporation, but I was hesitant to do so. In my first draft of this message, I wrote that my hesitation was based on the four hours of bad road between Mobile and Tuscaloosa and the time commitment that serving on the House Corporation requires. THETA CHI GAVE ALUMNUS A GREAT START Spotlight on H. Harold Williams '49

When **Harold Williams '49** attended Alabama in 1946, he was asked to visit Theta Chi and he recalls, "**Perry Ingram '48**

put a button on me and I didn't take it off." He enjoyed visiting Theta Chi and that was all there was to it—he joined. Theta Chi was a great experience for Harold. He was exposed to leadership roles, handling the dealings of a business, and the meaning of true camaraderie.

Before attending Alabama, he entered the Air Force in 1942 and spent time in India as a

chief clerk in an engineering office of an air service squadron. He helped operate and repair depot for planes in efforts to remove the Japanese from India and Burma. In 1946 he returned home to Alabama. While in the Fraternity, he became Chapter president in 1948. When he took over the Chapter, it was not doing very well financially. He gave his time and support to turn Alpha Phi around. Harold says, "I've had a great life and Theta Chi did very much to get me started. My presidency there was a great volt of electricity; it showed me I could do some great things."

Harold earned an accounting degree in 1949 and—following Eloise Wilkins, whom he met just two days after returning from India applied for law school in Columbia. He says being president of Theta Chi really helped him on his application for law school. They both received graduate degrees, Harold's for law and Eloise's for teaching. The two were married in 1953 in their hometown of Pell City,

> Alabama. Harold says he married her "after chasing her for seven years, nine months, 11 days, five hours, and 20 minutes."

In 1952, Harold began his career as an attorney at Balch & Bingham in Birmingham. He retired 14 years ago but still takes care of some daily business for the firm. Harold and Eloise have donated much of their time throughout their lives on

boards and committees. Harold has also given his time teaching Sunday school. Through life, he has learned much about the value of people and relationships. He tries to bring joy to others and says you should "try to lighten the corner where you are."

In his spare time, Harold enjoys photography and has taken pictures for various things, including his law firm, his church, baby dedications and baptisms, historical events, and clubs. He also enjoys reading, especially about politics and history. He and Eloise have two grown children, Richard and Anna, both Samford University graduates. Harold and Eloise live in Birmingham but enjoy visiting Pell City often. Last December, they were grand marshals of the Pell City Annual Christmas Parade. E-mail Harold at hwilliams@balch.com.

When **Don Bell '61** visited Theta Chi at Alabama, he realized he was among friends and decided to join. His experience at

Theta Chi was a great one that taught him many things. Most importantly it taught him about camaraderie and leadership.

While an undergraduate, Don held various positions within the Chapter, including vice president and president. At that time, Don helped organize the fundraising to build a new Chapter House. "It seemed impossible to raise enough money for a fraternity

house but we did it and built it. However, I never got to live in it. I graduated a month before it opened," he says. Raising these funds, putting teams together to head up projects, and the leadership experiences he gained are some of his best memories. Other favorite memories include playing intramurals with his brothers and the great parties they had, especially the Pirates Ball.



Don received a bachelor of science in electrical engineering and is president and chief executive officer for Bell Microproducts. He founded the

> company in 1988 and it is now one of the largest companies worldwide in the IT distribution industry. For his achievements, Don is in the Engineering Hall of Fame of the State of Alabama. Don's leadership experiences have taught him that leadership is the most important thing a company or organization can have. "If you have true leadership, then the team does well. If you do not have leadership, then you won't achieve the

same success you would otherwise. Whether it be in sports, chapters, universities, or companies, the ones that do well are the ones that have a great leader who can rally the people to do their best and can achieve success for individuals as well as for the collective group."

The advice Don would like to give to young alumni is to understand your goals and totally

commit yourself to achieving them. He also reminds undergraduates that college is a great time to develop skills and relationships, and to the best possible degree figure out what you want to do in life. He says, "Total commitment towards these goals differentiates those people who will be successful and happy later in life. Figuring it out and then doing it is the most important thing in life."

Don says he is proud to be a Theta Chi. "It is a great Chapter that has developed over the years, and there are great people who have come after me. I think very highly of the National Fraternity and I'm very proud of Alpha Phi of Theta Chi."

He grew up in Montgomery, Alabama, and now lives in Woodside, California. In his spare time, Don enjoys racing cars for the International Motor Sports Association Series and has been racing for 35 years. He also enjoys traveling to Europe and, recently, the North Pole. I attended games occasionally but once my three cheerleading daughters were busy with Friday night lights, my travels to Tuscaloosa came to a halt. In 1996 I was living in High Point, North Carolina, and this was my chance to introduce my son to real football, not this cheap imitation of football in the ACC. We went to the Alabama versus N.C. State game in Raleigh, and it was a perfect day for football. Late in the game my son said, "Dad, this is the biggest game I have ever seen. The crowd is so loud and the stadium is huge!" I realized then that I had failed as a graduate of the University. His measure of crowd noise, venue, and football was a game in Raleigh. I decided to join Tide Pride the next year and have attended virtually every home game since.

My first home game with my son was a very special event in 1996 for the Alabama versus Auburn game at Legion Field. We left Thursday afternoon so we could visit the Fraternity house, Bryant Museum, and the campus. My son had a big day leaning on the goal post at Bryant Denny Stadium, lunch with about 60 brothers, talking to Clem Gryska, watching the Crimson Tide practice on Friday, and pictures and a chat with Coach Stallings on the practice field. In what seemed to be a perfect ending, 'Bama won on Saturday in the closing seconds with a Kitchens to Riddle swing pass for a touchdown. Then to everyone's surprise, Gene Stallings retired as we listened to the post-game show while heading home.

That's how it all began. Now every trip to Tuscaloosa on game day starts with a visit at the Fraternity house. I guess I've seen about 75% of my pledge class over the years as well as many others who stop by the house. I've gotten to know brothers from the eighties, nineties, and more while at the house for lunch on game days. I want everyone to know you are always welcome. During the 2007 season we had two pledge class reunions, and I foresee more of these events in the future. 
He'll Still be Your Brother and Trusted Friend—Just Older A Note to Undergraduate Members
