Scholarship Established in Honor of RON GARIKES'80

The \$2,000 scholarship will be awarded annually to fund a student's attendance at the SMPS national conference. Alpha Phi Alumnus Testifies before House Committee on Financial Services

Mike Washburn '77 Speaks about Community Banking

Mike Washburn '77, president and CEO of Red Mountain Bank in Birmingham and a member of Community Bankers Association of Alabama's board of directors, testified on the issue of financial restructuring on October 21 before the House Committee on Financial Services in Washington, D.C.

At the invitation of U.S. Congressman Spencer Bachus (R-Vestavia Hills), ranking member of the committee, Mike, who also serves as vice chairman of the Congressional Affairs Committee of ICBA, provided positive testimony concerning the one segment of the financial system that is working well—the community banking sector.

The testimony was provided in the midst of one of the most difficult times many Americans have witnessed. In his testimony, carried live on C-SPAN, Mike characterized community banks as "strong, common sense leaders that did not engage in the practices that led to the current crisis" and as "open for business, making loans, accepting deposits, and ready to help all Americans weather these difficult times."

Mike's testimony focused on five key elements: the need to address excessive concentration, essential emergency measures, effective bank regulatory structure, maintaining and strengthening the separation of bank-

ing and commerce, and how congress can improve the regulatory system.

In his closing, Mike reiterated the important role that community banks play in the economic well-being of individuals across our country.

As the University of Alabama grows and attracts some of the best and brightest students from around the country, the administration has made an effort to clean up the area of University Boulevard known as "the strip." With several businesses not renewing their lease, this is an opportune time for new and better establishments to open.

Brother Adrian Leach '07 took advantage of these vacancies to realize his goal of opening a restaurant. With the partnership of his father, Tripp, friend Chris Payne, and six months of renovations and construction, Adrian opened the popular rooftop restaurant The Bear Trap.

"I wanted to open a kind of place that Tuscaloosa has never seen before. We wanted The Bear Trap to be a place unlike your typical restaurant," says Adrian.

Boasting a full view of University Boulevard and Bryant-Denny Stadium and some delicious backyard cuisine, the restaurant has been very successful. From the Editor Mike Sanders '78

on October 9 it finally occurred to me that I was mortal. I had a heart attack and was told it was "mild," which I guess was supposed to make me feel lucky. The heart attack happened on Thursday, I had a stent inserted on Friday, and I was back at work on Monday.

Last March I went to the doctor because of chronic pain in my knuckles and elbows. The doctor diagnosed me with arthritis and gave me a prescription for arthritis medication. The pain never went away completely, and on October 9 it came back with a vengeance.

Heart attacks don't occur like you see in the movies. I didn't clutch my chest and fall gracefully to the ground. I was driving to work and the pain became so intense I almost got to the point where I couldn't grip the steering wheel. I knew it was only arthritis but in the back of my head I had three main thoughts:

• I wondered if knuckle and elbow pain had anything to do with a heart attack.

- I had a clear mental image of my late dad telling me always to wear clean underwear when you travel. If I was having a heart attack, he would be proud of me for having clean underwear on.
- I also had a clear mental image of Roger Couch '76, the pledge marshall for our class. At our first meeting Roger told us to look around the room and see the people who would be in our wedding and who would carry our casket. I started counting who I thought might actually be willing to carry me around.

I've always heard to put an aspirin under your tongue at the onset of a heart attack. I carry a bottle of aspirin in my work bag, so I placed one under my tongue to dissolve. The heart surgeon said I was lucky to have taken the aspirin and that it may have been what minimized the effects of the attack. In the end I didn't have any damage to the heart muscle itself, which was the good news. The bad news

is that the monthly prescriptions run more than \$700. The intention of buying a Porsche when my mid-life crisis begins has been put on hold.

The reason I am telling you this is because you need to stay healthy. God forbid if this should happen to you, but just in case always have an aspirin on your person. If you carry a briefcase, keep an aspirin in it. If nothing else, wrap an aspirin in aluminum foil and keep it in your pocket with your keys and change. Lose weight, enjoy life, and get off of the couch—my new motto.
