Theta Chi Granted Lot on University Boulevard Support of Every Brother Needed to Move Forward

he past few months have been met with mixed emotion for Alpha Phi. On April 20 I received news from House Corporation President Mike Sanders '78 that our housemother, Kathy Murphy, was named Housemother of the Year at the Order of Omega awards banquet. For those of you who know Kathy, she does outstanding work for our Chapter and we are fortunate to have her.

On April 27 I placed a call to Pete Mackey '78 and asked if he had spoken with his son in Tuscaloosa. I had just seen a picture from Twitter of the tornado passing south of Bryant Denny stadium. I had the emptiest feeling knowing what destruction was taking place. My next few hours were spent trying to contact the Chapter to make sure everyone was accounted for. Several brothers had close calls and suffered property losses, but as we would expect, these young men proudly stepped up and immediately began to contribute to the recovery effort.

Over the next week, as I watched the news reports and took in the devastation, I began preparing for a business trip. As I was getting ready to walk out the door, I received a text message from Pete telling me that Mike Sanders **'78** had died. Mike worked diligently for the Chapter over the past couple of years and played a crucial part in trying to secure a lot for construction of a new Chapter House. A group of brothers attended Mike's funeral on May 11 in Sheffield. The night before the funeral, several of us had dinner in Birmingham where I learned Brother Mason Easley '00 had also passed away.

A few days later Pete asked me to step into Mike's position as president on the House Corporation. The next 12 days were very reflective for me, and many of us were waiting anxiously for the news from President Witt on our lot application. On May 24, Wes Wicker '79 told me the news I had been waiting to hear for the last three years: "Dr. Witt called me this afternoon to tell me that the Site Selection Committee has awarded Theta Chi the next lot on University Boulevard." President Witt and the leadership of his office have been great advocates for the Greek system in this endeavor, and they are to be commended.

The next 12 months will be critical to our success as we form our long-term project plans and strategy. I want to thank all those who have made a financial commitment to the project. For those that have not, I ask that you give serious consideration to what the Fraternity means to you and the relationships you have because of it.

Gentlemen, the challenge before us is simple. Encourage every brother that you are personal friends with to make an annual financial commitment over a five-year period. Regardless of your pledge amount, your participation is needed to make this campaign a success.

ike Pope '80 joined the Alpha Phi Chapter initially for the social aspects. As the years rolled by, he grew to truly appreciate the deeper meaning associated with the Fraternity: friendship, loyalty, character, and brotherhood.

His favorite memories are from the late-night work parties as a pledge and cruising with Pops and Tojo in the convertible with Boston blaring. He recalls his initiation and time as a pledge marshall. Mike has taken his leadership beyond the walls of the Chapter House. He serves as the vice president and operations manager for Technology Service Corporation's Alabama operations. He never ceases to learn

Two of my old college roommates, **Randy Griffin '76** and **Mike Sanders '78**, have joined the Chapter Eternal: Randy in October of 2009 and Mike in May. Rare is the day that I don't think of one of them. Both loved Theta Chi and carried their weight in the Chapter in ways that many of us never saw or realized. I miss them both and know that countless others join me.

Randy joined Theta Chi as a student at Troy State and transferred to the U of A in 1973. Of course, he was no stranger to Alpha Phi. He and his older brother, **Tom '70**, had been frequenting Theta Chi's halls for quite some time. In January of 1977, **Reed Rogers '79**, **Bill Page '77**, Randy, and I invaded 23 Cherokee Hills, a nice home in a southeast

Tuscaloosa neighborhood, where Randy and I shared a bedroom.

I have heard it said that everyone has some genius in them; you just have to know where to look. It was during this time that I saw Randy's genius. He loved the woods and felt comfortable in nature. He understood animals in a way that few humans do, could fix things that were broken, and build items from scratch. Not being able to do either, I was envious of the ease with which he could work with his hands.

Randy moved to a farm in Montgomery, started his own construction company, and went to work for the Retirement Systems of Alabama. I spent many a night at that farm house over the next several years, stopping there each time I passed through. That is probably the happiest I remember him. That said, I never really saw him unhappy. Randy's basic life philosophy was "it's all good," even in 2008 when he was diagnosed with cancer. The night before his first surgery, I called to wish him luck. I could hear the Beijing Olympic Games theme playing on the television in his hospital room. We had idle chatter until I summoned up the nerve to ask him if he was ready for what lay ahead. His response, "let the games begin," was vintage Randy Griffin.

The next year and a half were not easy. He did not go it alone, however. His mother, Edith, brother, Tom, and good friend and physician George Handey, were at his side. Through it all, he kept the same positive attitude. Edith was his primary caregiver until he died. I spoke with her recently and asked how tough that last year was. "I would not have had it any

Mike Sanders and I were pledge brothers. His primary claim to fame that first year was that he could stick his whole fist in his mouth. Mike went to work in the nuclear power industry at Browns Ferry near his home. He worked on the construction side, which took him to garden spots such as Dayton, Tennessee (think Scopes monkey trial), and a few small towns in South Carolina. In the mid-'80s, Carol and I ran into Mike at Lennox Square in Atlanta. He was walking out of a department store with seven giant beach towels (one for each day of the week), having decided to drop out for a few months to get a tan.
